

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MICHAEL ARMSTRONG 1934-2016



Michael, as many of you know was a much loved head teacher at Harwell Primary School, from 1981 to 1999. Sadly he died in

March this year and we are hoping to hold an afternoon to celebrate his life, at Harwell Primary School on Saturday 3rd September from 2pm. There will be time to write in the book of condolences and record vour own memories, share photographs and anecdotes and talk about the man who inspired so many. Tom, his eldest son is hoping to join us and we plan to share the DVD of his funeral with those who missed it or who would have liked to be there. For many years, while at Harwell and after his retirement. Michael taught teachers at The Middlebury Bread Loaf School of English in America. His course, 'Describing the imagination', inspired many of his students, to think about the richness and value of stories, especially and originally those written by young children. He wrote several books about children as writers and was well respected in the educational world.

During his time at Harwell Michael shared his love of music and the school became rich in music and the performing arts. Michael wrote plays and, with his son Tom an opera, The Buried Moon, which the children performed to great acclaim. Music became a central part of school life with choirs, orchestras and lessons in violin and woodwind. He also inspired us

all to take children's writing much more seriously, to read stories more closely, to talk to children about them and to try and understand the thought processes behind them. Stories were shared, published and celebrated every Friday in assembly.



Through his example he encouraged all of us to put the child at the heart of everything we did, both in and out of the classroom. Children led the way and loved working with him, whether writing, painting, solving problems, making go karts, an Archimedes screw or a child sized pinhole camera. Pupils who worked with Michael, now adults and parents themselves, still recall the joy of exploration and discovery, of talking to someone who fully appreciated the seriousness of their writings and who always had time to listen to them.

It will be a good time to visit the school; to meet with old school friends, share memories, note the changes that have taken place since Michael's time (during Peter Cansell's headship and now with Bryn Gibson) and reminisce. Running the Race

A few years ago, whilst working as a GP, I had a visit from a man who had ruptured his Achilles tendon, that which attaches the calf muscle to the heel. He was rather embarrassed to explain that it happened during the Dad's race at the school sports day. Out of condition and sprinting from a cold start, his hope of sporting glory was cruelly cut short by a 'pop' in the back of his leg and a humiliating crash to the ground.

School sports days with their egg-and-spoon, sack and other races, are very much a summer tradition.
Summer and sport are closely associated for many people, whether it be following
Wimbledon, the Tour de France, the US

Open, cricket Test Matches, the Summer Olympics, family rounders, or wellywanging at the village fete.

The Apostle Paul was fond of describing the Christian faith in terms of sport. Writing to a first-century church in the Greek city of Corinth, the location of an annual Games, second only in importance to the ancient Olympics, he says

Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the Games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever.

1 Corinthians 9:24-25.

So how is the Christian life like a race?

For a start, it only lasts for a time. Some get to run a great distance, others much less, but we each have a limited time on this earth, that we should "live aright", as the funeral service puts it.

Secondly, it needs commitment. As with studying for exams (another summer tradition!), long-term relationships, parenting children, or pursuing a career or significant project, the Christian faith

takes day-in, day-out commitment and focus. Every day we have to choose whether to press on or 'throw in the towel'.

Thirdly, it has a goal. If we decide to don the kit and get down onto the track in the

full view of the crowd of spectators to join the Christian race, we are doing so because there is a prize to be won, a 'crown' as Paul puts it.

Thankfully, It does not depend on our performance, since it is a team sport, but we do need to be on the team. Jesus, through his life, death and resurrection, has won the prize for us, which will be shared with all the team members.

So if you are worried that taking part risks rupturing a spiritual Achilles tendon or worse, fret not. The eternal crown is already in the hands of the victorious team captain.


SHARLANDS VISIT

INTERVIEW WITH PHILIP GARNER

At our recent Songs of Praise event we heard from Philip Garner.

When being introduced, friends would often say something like 'this is Phil, his dad is a vicar', from which came the reply 'Oh nice to meet you, are you going to follow in your father's footsteps and become a vicar too?' Annoying and ridiculous!



If you have Christian parents does it make you a Christian? "Well," Philip says, "I grew up in a family full of Christians and to anyone looking I probably appeared to be one - attending church and being kind and well behaved, etc". But it wasn't until Philip went to a school Christian Union (CU) meeting where a visiting speaker talked about creation and space, that he realised that his Christianity wasn't personal. Up until that point he hadn't realised that there is a blockage between man and God. "We need to offer a simple three-part prayer saying sorry to God for my sin, thank you for the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and asking Jesus Christ to come into my life. Then by reading the bible, Jesus can become our guide and role model, our Lord, "says Philip.

How did you become a Christian? When Philip was 11 years old, just after the CU meeting, he went into his room and quietly prayed that prayer to God. He was very aware that people had been

praying for him, and after he decided to commit his life to God he told his

parents. The following Sunday, his father asked him to stand up in the Church service to tell everyone what had happened. He believes that it is very important to publicly announce this decision of faith.

How has being a Christian made a difference in your life? Philip's choice of hymn was

Be Thou my Vision – and this is the big change that he sees in his life.
He believes that Christians are to demonstrate Jesus Christ – that we're called to do the things that God would have us do, rather than everything we'd like to do. Philip admits it's an ongoing struggle, and so to help him, he receives daily bible verses to his mobile phone. When he thinks about what Jesus did by dying that dreadful death on the cross for him – he feels totally unable to pay back the amazing gift – so instead tries to pass on some of this kindness to others – demonstrating Jesus Christ.

Be Thou my Vision, O Lord of my heart; Naught be all else to me, save that Thou art; Thou my best Thought, by day or by night, Waking or sleeping, Thy presence my light.
