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CHRISTIANS AGAINST POVERTY

Christians Against Poverty are a national charity that seek to help people in debt. Their vision is to bring freedom and good news to the poor in every community through a nationwide network of CAP projects.

Through the work of Christians Against Poverty (CAP), ten people become debt free every working day. Susanna's is just one of these stories – and what an incredible story it is.

Susanna fell into debt when cancer left her disabled and unable to work. 'My partner had walked out, saying he couldn't watch me die,' she explains. 'I had no income, all the usual bills to pay, and a mortgage to pay.'

Imagine the terror of living with cancer, while facing the breakdown of your relationship and the pressures of debt all at once.

'I thought I was going to lose my house. It got to the point where I felt sick every time the phone rang. It was all too much. In the end, I attempted to take my life.' Sadly, Susanna is not alone. Three quarters of those who come to CAP for help say they've been afraid to pick up the phone. Over a third have considered or even attempted suicide as a way out of debt.* Thankfully, hundreds of UK churches are bringing hope and freedom to families across their communities in partnership with CAP.

'Sheila [local CAP Debt Coach] was like my guardian angel,' says Susanna. 'When she visited me at home, she walked through the door and straight away lifted the despair. The love from her and the church was everything. They helped me prioritise and make sure all the essentials were paid for. I was able to pay back everything I owed.'

Now debt free, Susanna is spending precious time with her family. She says, 'My kids have their smiley, happy mum back. I'm still here to watch my grandchildren grow up'. Plus, after being invited along by Sheila, Susanna is part of her local church where she's building friendships and growing in her faith.

RECTOR'S LETTER

The daffodils are coming up, and other signs of spring are around us. As flowers emerge from the bare earth, birds begin nest-building, and apparently dead trees start to produce fresh green leaves, it is good to be joining in with God's work of bringing new life and restoration.

February saw the third occasion of hosting a 'Repair Café' at St Matthew's

(see page 4) at which volunteers from Sustainable Didcot restored 76 household items to use, with delicious cakes and coffee provided by Harwell Explorer Scouts.

We also report on the work of Christians Against Poverty (CAP) to

restore people to a place of financial stability, and restore hope to the despairing (pages 2 & 8). We also report on fundraising for The Porch, Hamlin Fistula, and Sue Ryder Hospice (pages 6 & 7), which all seek to bring restoration and healing to different groups of people.

The Christian faith is all about restoration and healing. Jesus was famous not just as a teacher, but also a healer, who had a dramatic ministry of restoring sight, health and even life. He restored outcasts to society, and direction to those who had lost their way. He taught and embodied the principles of love and forgiveness, grace and sacrifice, that enable the restoration of relationships not just between humans, but also between us and God. He sends his Holy Spirit that humans might have the image of God



restored in them. And he promises to return again to restore all things to their rightful place, to bring justice and health to the whole of creation.

The season of Lent (meaning 'spring') is an opportunity to reflect on our brokenness and need of healing and restoration, and it concludes with the

> celebration of Easter and the memory of the dramatic events of Jesus' death and resurrection. Jesus' resurrection – a historical event – is also a picture of the transformation from utter brokenness to glorious restoration that is possible only by the power of God.

The Apostle Paul reassures Christians in Romans 8:11 *"The Holy Spirit raised Jesus* from the dead. If the same Holy Spirit lives in you, He will give life to your bodies in the same way."

Susanna's story on page 2 is a dramatic example of the resurrection power of Jesus, made available and transforming lives, bringing hope out of despair and life out of death. God invites all of us to experience and join in with that movement of new life and restoration.

REPAIR CAFÉ REVIEW

We had a very successful Repair Cafe on 15th February at St Matthew's Harwell, as part of the Big Fix 2020. Thank you to every




one who came along and supported it.

In total there were 79 repair cafes across the country taking part, including several who were running their first ever event that day.



We had a great day, with tea and cakes from the Explorer Scouts, and 17 volunteer repairers from Sustainable Didcot. In total, 37 people brought 87 items to be fixed, including 24 sewing repairs,18 tools for sharpening, jewellery, clocks, 4 bicycles, broken chairs, and 26 electrical items (including a radio shaped like a duck!).



There were only 11 things that we couldn't fix. We were also visited by the new local MP, David Johnston.

We are now compiling our records to send in to the Big Fix organisers - the aim was to undertake 2000 repairs across the country and we made a great contribution to that in Harwell!

HARWELL ALMSHOUSES

There is a vacancy in the Frances Geering Almshouse, situated in the High Street, Harwell. The Almshouse is an historic feature in the village, and comprises two houses, which are owned and managed by the charity, which was originally set up in 1730 to provide accommodation for women "in need". The Trustees are looking for a local lady requiring single accommodation and who is able to live independently.



This is an opportunity to live in a modernised Grade 2* listed building in the centre of a thriving village community. Many facilities are within easy walking distance. There are two shops, a pub and an excellent bus service to Didcot and the surrounding areas. The refurbished village hall provides many social activities.

The cosy single floored accommodation consists of a sitting room, bedroom, bathroom, kitchen and utility area and has its own private entrance. There is a small landscaped garden at the back.

Preference will be given to those who have lived in the Parish for 5 years but in the absence of village applicants, ladies from the surrounding area would be considered.

INTERVIEW WITH LIZ ROBERTS



You can read about debt relief help from Christians Against Poverty

(CAP) in our community on page 2, but the charity also provides free money management courses – CAP Money – to help budget, save, and prevent debt.

Eight trained Coaches run a three-session course on Saturday mornings roughly once every two months in either Harwell or Chilton. The same team also run

bespoke courses at the request of agencies such as Turning Point in Didcot.

One of the Saturday Coaches is Liz Roberts. Liz works for housing association Soha and has been a churchgoer in Harwell since coming to the village 27 years ago. She says that, as soon as she moved out of home (in Essex), she

left church behind, too - with one exception: "I went prison visiting with a local group of young Christians because I needed something interesting for my CV!" In Harwell, Liz volunteers for CAP because "it's such a practical way of being useful in the community, giving something back to the church which has supported me and my family (husband Tim and two now adult sons) from the moment we arrived. It's also wonderful to put CAP's mission statement – Always Hope – into practice, helping delegates make often quite simple changes to lighten financial worries. Sometimes, it's just a matter of being another pair of - non-judgemental - eyes taking a look: it's a privilege."

"Some people who would like budgeting help may prefer a course outside their own neighbourhood so it's great that there are CAP Money courses being delivered by churches all over the country at all times and days of the week. That also makes for a really useful network for us Coaches as we get to hear the latest information and insights from a wide range of settings."

> Liz encourages anyone thinking about doing the course that "you won't be preached at, in any sense. For a start, there's no religious agenda – all the Coaches are motivated by being Christians with a commitment to the community where we live and work, but anyone looking for new ideas to manage their

money is welcome, regardless of their faith or lack of it. We're also not telling anyone what to do - we're just excited to share a system than can really help people. Come and see!"
